SEXUAL ASSAULT NURSE EXAMINER PROGRAM

Texas Health Sexual Assault Nurse Examiners (SANE) provide compassionate and comprehensive medical forensic examinations to patients who have experienced sexual violence. The Texas Health SANE Program maintains a team of specially trained nursing staff: 23 certified nurses and eight nurse trainees.* The program responds to 11 wholly owned Texas Health hospitals and impacted more than 533 patients from Sept. 1, 2018, to Aug. 31, 2019. Texas Health partners with a community SANE program to provide SANE services to Texas Health hospitals in Plano and Allen. The Texas Health SANE Program continues to provide 40-hour SANE classes to nurses throughout North Texas, as well as outreach and prevention education. Through community outreach and education programs focused on awareness and prevention, the SANE program impacted 3,392 community stakeholders and law enforcement members, as well as 4.173 school and college age students.*

FAITH COMMUNITY NURSING

Texas Health's Faith Community Nursing program grew significantly in 2019, with twice as many nurses participating and the addition of almost 100 faith community health promoters. With the goal of intentionally integrating spiritual care with the practice of nursing, 235 Faith Community Nurses maintained 123 congregational covenants representing 163,500 individuals in 2019. Recognizing the program's outstanding work, the Faith Community Nursing program received the American Hospital Association 2019 Healthcare Award for Volunteer Excellence.



BEDSIDE PRODUCTS SELECTION COMMITTEE

Texas Health's Bedside Products Selection Committee met monthly in 2019 to review, evaluate, and name standards for products and equipment.

RELIABLE CARE BLUEPRINTING™

Reliable Care Blueprinting[™] (RCB), Texas Health's approach to care design, focused on piloting and deploying new modules in 2019. RCB expanded its scope to include a non-clinical module (Complaints and Grievances), as well as adding four hospitals to the existing Supportive and Palliative Care Program. Throughout the year, RCB deployed three new modules and piloted one new module. Forty nurses participated in design teams, which standardized system processes to enhance reliability and improve the consumer experience.

NURSING INFORMATICS

Nursing Informatics is a specialty that integrates nursing science, computer science and information science to manage and communicate data, information, knowledge and wisdom in nursing practice. In 2019, Texas Health's nursing informaticists supported a number of key Texas Health initiatives, including the CareConnect Clinical Workgroups; integration projects, such as Alaris interoperability and vital sign integration; development of predictive analytic tools; patient acuity; and CareConnect functionality for all nursing practice efforts with a technology impact.



UNIT-BASED COUNCILS

Shared governance is a priority for nurses at Texas Health, providing an opportunity for impacting decisions that affect their work. Unit-based councils throughout Texas Health give nurses a voice in making positive changes in their practice environment and improving the patient experience and employee satisfaction.

NURSING CONGRESS

Led by Katherine Dungey, B.S.N., R.N., Texas Health Alliance, and Tessa Kennedy, B.S.N., R.N., Texas Health Southwest, Nursing Congress in 2019 served as a vetting body for matters impacting nursing care while providing opportunities for input and feedback from direct care staff. The group achieved the goal of improving communication across Texas Health entities by using individual SharePoint sites.

During the Nursing Congress quarterly meetings, entity representatives gave feedback on what was going well and what barriers they faced that resulted in collaboration between entities to find solutions and ultimately success. Nursing Congress continued to strengthen the voice of nurses through shared decision-making and increased collaboration among entities.



CONTINUING EDUCATION

NURSING CAREER ADVANCEMENT PROGRAM

Through Sept. 30, 1,203 nurses participated in the Nursing Career Advancement Program (NCAP) at Texas Health in 2019. NCAP recognizes and financially rewards nurses for their dedication to their hospital, profession and education. Nurses advance through levels in the program with a variety of professional development activities.

RESEARCH

Texas Health's nurse scientists helped nurses throughout the system conduct 49 research projects in 2019. Many of the research teams were multidisciplinary, featuring nurses, dietitians, pharmacists, physical therapists and other health care professionals.

A tool to help nurses reach their professional development goals, My Nursing Journey continued to serve as a valuable resource for nurses in 2019. Planning began in the fall to move the tool to a new career pathing program in 2020.

NURSING EXCELLENCE FUND

The Nursing Excellence Fund provided continuing education and conference scholarships for 184 nurses throughout Texas Health in 2019. The fund also provides academic funding for nurses earning advanced degrees, including those training to become clinical nurse leaders.

CENTRAL STAFFING OFFICE

Texas Health's Central Staffing Office managed more than 32,000 unscheduled absences in 2019 and continues to provide more than 400 clinical full-time employees throughout Texas Health. Supplemental staffing for Security was added in 2019.

MAGNET® REDESIGNATION

Two Texas Health hospitals were redesignated as Magnet® hospitals, the most prestigious designation honoring nursing services, in 2019 - Texas Health Fort Worth for the fourth time and Texas Health Arlington Memorial for the second time. Presented by American Nurses Credentialing Center, the designation recognizes health care organizations for quality patient care, nursing excellence and innovations in the nursing practice.

WORKPLACE VIOLENCE **PREVENTION AND INTERVENTION**

Texas Health's Workplace Violence Prevention and Intervention Program developed a number of tools and resources in 2019 to support employees in preventing and responding to violent patients and visitors. Leadership of the program, which includes Employee Health and

Human Resources representatives, created a manager's toolkit, a door sign for identifying violent patients and an alert in the electronic health record to identify aggressive behavior by patients and visitors. A position statement was created and distributed on Nursing units. Active shooter and Crisis Prevention Intervention training continued throughout the year.

ADVANCE PRACTICE REGISTERED NURSES

From caring for patients in Texas Health Physicians Group practices to serving as clinical nurse leaders to leading Healthy Education and Lifestyle Program (HELP) clinics, advance practice registered nurses can be found throughout Texas Health. These nurses use their specialty training to plan and provide care for a wide variety of patients.



MEALS THAT HEAL

Led by two nurse practitioners, an innovative program at Texas Health Dallas connects seniors being discharged with meal programs and follow-up contact to make sure they're doing well. Meals that Heal features meals delivered through the Visiting Nurse Association and Meals on Wheels with deliverers asking a series of questions when they visit a patient's home. If issues are discovered, the deliverer contacts the Visiting Nurse Association social worker, who contacts Texas Health Dallas nurse practitioners Stephanie Lindsey-Taylor, M.S.N., R.N., AGNP-BC, and Rincy Thomas, M.S.N., APRN, AGPCNP-C, for followup. Since the program began two years ago, they've seen no readmissions for the 85 patients in the program within 30 days, and fewer visits to the Emergency Department within 30 and 60 days.

SPOTLIGHT ON TEXAS HEALTH DALLAS

HEARTFELT EDUCATION FOR NURSES AND CONSUMERS

Texas Health Dallas' Heart and Vascular Services provided several educational opportunities in 2019 that focused on best practices for care teams and consumers. Valve coordinators Barbara Wright, B.S.N., R.N., and Jennifer Grell, B.S.N., R.N., spearheaded the creation of a transcatheter aortic valve replacement (TAVR)

council for providers in North Texas to join together and share best practices and learn from other programs in North Texas. In addition, Texas Health Dallas hosted a comprehensive Atrial Fibrillation Workshop in June that provided education and information to almost 50 individuals dealing with atrial fibrillation.

EMERGENCY CARING: CHANGES POSITIVELY IMPACT PATIENT CARE AND EXPERIENCE

From changes in the staffing and triage flow plans to new volunteer roles and discharge phone call processes, the Emergency Department (ED) at Texas Health Dallas took significant steps in 2019 to improve quality care and the patient experience. Nurses in the department were supported through regular education on trauma topics, high-level personal protective equipment redesign and education, a weekly update email, and a revised staffing plan. In addition, care in the department was enhanced through an ED Code Sepsis, door to EKG reading improvement initiative and the new triage flow plan.


The various initiatives had significant positive results. For example, the revised triage process increased the capacity for caring for patients with more serious issues by 20 percent. In addition, the Code Sepsis project reduced the antibiotic order to administration time by 20 minutes. As a result of all of the initiatives, HCAHPS (Hospital Consumer Assessment of Healthcare Providers and Systems) survey results regarding ED care increased by approximately six percent.

DRIVING AWAY CANCER

Part of the Arts in Healthcare program at Texas Health Dallas, the workshop was a collaboration between the oncology nurse navigation program at the hospital and the Cancer Support Community North Texas.

INNOVATIVE APPROACHES TO IMPROVING THE PATIENT EXPERIENCE

From competitions to a comfort cart, nurses on the fifth floor med-surg unit at Texas Health Southwest Fort Worth used innovative approaches to improve the patient experience in 2019. Patient birthdays were celebrated with cards, singing and gifts, such as a joke book made from Post-it notes. Nurses encouraged patients to walk by posting stickers every ten feet in the hallway and creating a board with race cars where patients could post their daily totals and compete with each other. In addition, the nurses on the unit used a comfort cart to improve the patient experience. The cart features items contributed by employees, including child and adult coloring books, reading glasses, puzzles and magazines.



SPOTLIGHT ON TEXAS HEALTH SOUTHWEST FORT WORTH

RESEARCH STUDY IMPROVES CONFIDENCE IN DETECTING HEMATOMAS

Shara Gray, B.S.N., R.N., CMSRN, Texas Health Southwest Fort Worth, completed a research study for her TCU Evidence-Based Practice Fellowship on "A Photographic Approach to Early Detection and Harm Reduction in Post-Mastectomy Patients." The study addressed the need for an objective method to differentiate

normal bruising after mastectomy from signs of a developing hematoma. Incision photography was used to monitor any changes in breast size, shape or color. Nurse confidence in identifying a developing hematoma increased by 17 percent at the end of the study.



NURSES HELP DEVELOP AND LEAD STEMI PROGRAM

Texas Health Southwest Fort Worth began a STEMI program in 2019 to address the needs of patients suffering from a serious type of heart attack known as a ST-elevation myocardial infarction (STEMI). Deemed as a STEMI-Receiving Center, the hospital has the necessary resources and manpower to provide percutaneous coronary intervention – a procedure used to treat blocked arteries – to heart attack patients, 24 hours, seven days a week. NURSES PROVIDE ESSENTIAL INPUT TO DESIGN OF NEW NICU

The unit-based council for the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU) at Texas Health Southwest Fort Worth provided feedback on their wants and needs for the hospital's new NICU. Their input was shared with the architect during construction planning meetings. Because of their advocacy, the nurses will have a staff breakroom with a bathroom in the new NICU. The new NICU will be double the size of the current unit, growing from eight to 16 beds.
