For the last 17 years, Ann has worked in Sanger, witnessing the incredible need for food and other services in the community. As an employee at an alternative school, she has seen the number of children and youth with serious mental health challenges increase dramatically over the years, and the demand for backpacks with food for the weekends continues to rise. Additionally, although parents ask about counseling resources for their children and family, the options to suggest have been limited. Enter THRIVE - an opportunity

to get additional resources into the community to address the entire needs of the youth and their family - not just piecemeal, fragmented, disconnected services. Ann feels bandaids have been put on situations for so long, however the THRIVE program allows the community to begin to stop the bleeding.

About the Texas Health Community Impact initiative

To address the identified needs of resiliency in youth ages 12–18, food insecurity, and lack of transportation in Sanger 76266 (Denton County), THRIVE (Together Harnessing Resources to Give Individuals Voice & Endurance) will bring mental health professionals, social service providers and food assistance directly to students at the schools and through the efforts of First Refuge Ministries. Texas Health considers the \$300,000 grant awarded to the collaborative as seed money for use as further financial support is gathered in the communities to meet long-term goals.

Social Determinants of Health'

Studies have found that access to public transportation and living in a highly populated city have a profoundly beneficial impact on mental health, reducing the risk of depression, especially for women and elderly, by increasing opportunities to move around and have an active social life.1



have limited access to healthy foods (population living more than 1/2 mile from nearest supermarket)



adults less than 25 years old do not have a high school diploma



households do not have a motor vehicle

Local leaders said

- There are strong potential partners among the agencies already working in behavioral health
- Access to behavioral health resources is limited due to transportation constraints

strong faith community

Focus Group Key Findings**

- There is a lack of access to behavioral health care, which causes community members to drive to other cities for services
- Depression, especially related to living in poverty, is a major issue
- There is a high need for reliable, same-day transportation
