Texas Health Fort Worth Justin Tower: The Triumph of a Community

A legacy of giving, a legacy of caring, donors support the promise of the Justin Tower.

A dream became a reality on Monday, April 4, with the opening of the Jane and John Justin Tower at Texas Health Harris Methodist Hospital Fort Worth.

Joseph DeLeon, president of Texas Health Fort Worth, summed up the historic occasion by saying, "As the region and our service area continues to grow, the Jane and John Justin Tower gives Texas Health Fort Worth the ability to take care of populations with services that will be demanded across our community. That's the reason we are so excited to open Justin Tower to its first patient today."

At a special preview celebration for donors of the Justin Tower, DeLeon reminded attendees about the work that went on behind the scenes to bring the Justin Tower to fruition. "All of the planning has been done with the patient experience in mind – offering patients and families not only quality medical care, but spaces that are conducive to healing and wellbeing."

The history of Texas Health Fort Worth is one of continued expansion and renovation as the hospital has grown to meet the community's healthcare needs. Behind new patient rooms, diagnostic areas, equipment, and new technology, have been loyal donors whose financial support has been steadfast. The Justin Tower is no exception.

Leading efforts to identify and rally potential donors to support Justin Tower was the campaign steering committee. Lynn Montgomery served as committee chair, and serving alongside Lynn were Dr. Lee Bloemendal, Mike Guyton, Pat Hawkins, Dee Kelly, Jr., Bill Lamkin, Anne Paup, and Dr. Greg Smith.

A tribute to Jane and John Justin, whose philanthropy made possible their namesake tower.

Jane and John Justin are legendary in Fort Worth and beyond. The Texas Health Resources Foundation is grateful to the Jane & John Justin Foundation, the organization that carries on their vision, for their generous lead gift for the new tower at Texas Health Harris Methodist Hospital Fort Worth. The name, the Jane and John Justin Tower, will forever honor the impact that the couple made on Fort Worth.

To tell their story, Roy Topham, Executive Director of the Jane & John Justin Foundation, had the idea to create an interactive kiosk located at Justin Tower to display the pictures and videos collected over a lifetime

"We are lucky to have great photos and footage of Jane and John from many stages in their lives," said Topham. "We wanted to give the community the opportunity to get to know this wonderful couple who are so instrumental in the history of Fort Worth."

"We are proud to provide compassionate, advanced care for the people we serve in honor of Jane and John."

Geesbreght Family Lounge, honoring the life and legacy of Dr. John Geesbreght

For 45 years, John Geesbreght, M.D. guided the emergency department at Texas Health Fort Worth, serving as medical director. During his long, successful career, he helped Texas Health Fort Worth's ER and trauma programs achieving regional and national recognition for innovative, quality care. To his wife Priscilla, he was a loving partner who helped raise a family of which he was tremendously proud. To his children and grandchildren, he was a cherished role model, mentor, and supporter. Dr. Geesbreght passed away on Aug. 4, 2019. Dr. Geesbreght and Priscilla had decided to make a financial gift to the Jane and John Justin Tower at Texas Health Fort Worth. After Dr. Geesbreght's passing, his family decided to honor his life and his legacy of caring by designating their gift to fund the beautiful and welcoming Geesbreght Family Lounge located on the ground floor.



We asked Priscilla and one of their sons, Alex, to share their thoughts about their gift, the man they knew as husband and father, and the legacy he left through the thousands of people to whom he provided care.

What led your family to make a financial gift to support the Justin Tower?

Priscilla: Giving to Texas Health Resources, specifically the Justin Tower project, was a tangible way to honor John's beloved hospital. The fulfillment it brought him for 45 years is immeasurable. John's commitment to his doctors, nurses, and medical staff was well known. Among a few other hand-picked opportunities, giving to the Justin Tower was an obvious choice.

Alex: Before he passed away, mom and dad decided together to make a financial gift to the Justin Tower. For as long as I can remember, they searched with open eyes for specific opportunities to help a group or an individual. Their philosophy was focused, my dad didn't believe in just giving to an organization without knowing where the funds were going and how they were going to be used. He never had any doubts about Texas Health Resources. The gift to the Justin Tower was significant and emblematic of the faith my parents had in the stewards of those funds. They knew their financial gift would be put to good use and would benefit the hospital, the community, and the patients.

How did your family feel when you first saw the Geesbreght Family Lounge?

Priscilla: The beauty of the space filled me with unexpected emotion, and the tears came. John would have been very touched. I wish he could have seen the completed project. He would have been in awe, as I certainly was. The seating configurations for family and friends of loved ones in the hospital are thoughtfully arranged, comfortable, and lovely. The art commissioned from local artisans is so beautiful and Texas worthy.

Alex: We were delighted with the space. My brother Andrew, my mom, and I went in and were just at a loss for words. It was unexpected, more special and touching than I think any of us thought it would be. It was extremely well done and nice. The time we spent together in the Geesbreght Family Lounge was very meaningful.

How does your family see the Justin Tower honoring Dr. Geesbreght's career and life? What do you want others to know about Dr. Geesbreght?

Priscilla: The plaque "Geesbreght Family Lounge" reflects John's belief in family being a priority in his life. He made time for each of our children and was a devoted husband, father and Popi. He was also dedicated to his professional family circle and gave of his energies and resources to be their loyal advocate.

Alex: The Geesbreght Family Lounge is a confluence of my dad's professional and personal lives that works perfectly in the space.

Alex, you also made a separate financial gift to the Justin Tower. Where did you designate your gift in the tower and why?

Alex: Yes. Carey, my wife, and I decided to give a gift to fund a nurse's station. We made the gift because I knew it was something important to my dad. This was something I knew my dad would have supported. The thing that always stood out to me was what an advocate my dad was for nurses and how appreciative he was for them. He often spoke about the reason an emergency department runs the way it does is because of the nurses.

What else would you like for us to know?

Priscilla: I was blessed to have been John's partner in life and raise our family together. He's gone, but not forgotten. His impact will long continue to be felt. I see our sons and daughters and our grandchildren carrying on the legacy of making a difference in both word and deed. That brings joy to my heart.

A Surgeon's Point of View: Olaide Ajayi, M.D., neurosurgeon, Texas Health Fort Worth

Olaide Ajayi, M.D., joined the medical staff at Texas Health Fort Worth five years ago. As a neurosurgeon, he and his patients will directly benefit from the new surgical operating rooms in the Jane and John Justin Tower. He says the neurosurgery program has evolved from being "robust" five years ago to one that has evolved and grown to include highly specialized services in stroke care.

"Practicing in the new Justin Tower gives me a front row seat to the thought that went into its design and the positive impact it will have on health care delivery in Fort Worth and Tarrant County, now and in to the future," said Dr. Ajayi. "It was an easy decision to support Justin Tower with my financial gift to fund the Pre-Op and Post-Anesthesia Care Unit (PACU). This new centralized area will directly impact my patients when they are prepped for surgery and return to recover in the same area with

the same nurse. Through my gift, I know I'm contributing to Justin Tower's success in a small way."

With each OR being more than 1,000 square feet with the most technologically advanced equipment available, Dr. Ajayi says it provides surgeons with better and efficient ways to take care of patients.

The room design also incorporates cameras into the overhead headlights, allowing the surgeons to broadcast surgeries to screens outside the OR, providing an excellent teaching opportunity for residents and other students.

Looking forward, Dr. Ajayi says, "It's an exciting time to be at Texas Health Fort Worth. I don't see the excitement and momentum created by the Justin Tower abating anytime soon. The largest construction project in Texas Health Resource's history was completed so smoothly, especially during a pandemic, and it already has such a significant impact on the hospital and the community. The flame for the next best way to grow will continue to burn brightly."

Doctors on the medical staff practice independently and are not employees or agents of the hospital except for the resident doctors in the hospital's graduate medical education program.

The Power of Two

How two busy physicians give back full time.

One couple, two doctors, two decades, and two busy practices in Dallas. Two college-aged children. Power couple Lawrence Hum, M.D. and Jane Nokleberg, M.D. live life at full speed, each running separate practices, and each making a difference in the lives of thousands in the North Texas community.

Dr. Hum is an emergency medicine physician with Emergency Medicine Consultants of TeamHealth, the practice that manages all the emergency doctors at Texas Health Resources. Dr. Nokleberg is part of Walnut Hill OB/GYN, where she enjoys taking care of women, their health, and their babies.

So how do they possibly find time to help lead major fundraising initiatives at Texas Health Resources? They make the time because it's important to them to keep the legacy of Texas Health thriving in North Texas. "Texas Health Resources has been a great place for us to practice and mature in our practices and our lives," said Dr. Nokleberg. "Collectively, we want to keep Texas Health a center of excellence as an investment in the future for the people and the community around us."

Inspired by Their Mentors

It also allows them to give back to the mentors who invested in them when they came to Dallas to practice medicine. Recently, Dr. Hum led the fundraising campaign to establish a medical education fund at Texas Health in honor of Dr. A. Compton Broders, a clinical professor of emergency medicine for the University of Texas Southwestern Medical School, where he was instrumental in helping to develop the Emergency Medicine Residency Program. Dr. Broders made an impact in Dallas/Fort Worth for more than 40 years through his emergency medicine services and served

in a number of leadership roles across Texas Health. He also was co-founder and Chief Operating Officer at Emergency Medicine Consultants, where Dr. Hum currently serves as Chief Medical Officer.

"As my mentor, Dr. Broders made an investment in me and the ability to pay it forward is important to Jane and myself," says Dr. Hum.

Dr. Nokleberg is co-chair of the pysician campaign for the Margot Perot Center renovation at Texas Health Presbyterian Hospital Dallas. She accepted the role, in part, out of respect for her mentors, Dr. Henry Estess and Dr. David Bookout, who co-founded her practice. "I came into a mature practice with quality doctors who could teach me more about medicine and life skills. It's important to embrace where we've been and how far we've come. As my mother taught me, what you give back, you receive tenfold."


Dr. Nokleberg says the time is now to devote to the giving campaigns at Texas Health Resources, such as the Margot Perot Center renovation project. The renovation project includes upgrading labor and delivery and surgical rooms, along with equipment and technology enhancements. These will allow the 40-year old center to accommodate growing patient needs for complex procedures and aid in the attraction and retention of top-quality physicians and medical staff.

Survivors Walk the Walk

Each year, a highlight of Puttin' on the Pink is the Survivor Model fashion show. This year featured 13 cancer survivors proudly walking the runway as survivors of this dreaded disease. One of the models, Fred Pecina, said, "A cancer diagnosis will bring you to your knees, force you to slow down, narrow your focus, and make you realize God is in control, not you."

Each one of these survivors can remember the day – the hour – when they heard their diagnosis. One of the models is a 20-year survivor, another is waiting for that last test to show all clear. At least four of these models were in their 30s when first diagnosed, the youngest was 32. And every one of them carried the lessons from their fight forward into the next phase of their lives.

No two models shared the same cancer, but they did share the same advice: **get tested because early detection is important to survival.**

Making a Difference

Meet John and Leahray Wroten

To say that John and Leahray Wroten are partial to Texas Health Resources would be an understatement. The Wrotens have been dedicated to Texas Health Resources, and John has served on the boards of Texas Health Plano and Texas Health Allen for more than 30 years. Together, they have volunteered hundreds of hours and raised millions of dollars by participating in capital campaigns for both campuses. Today, John Wroten serves as a trusted adviser to the leadership teams at both hospitals and is a member of the Texas Health Resources Collin County Community Impact Leadership Council.

In 2021, the couple made a life-saving decision to help the community of Allen and the North Texas area. The Wrotens provided the lead gift of \$300,000 to help Texas Health Allen secure its certification as a Primary Stroke Center. The certification will establish the hospital as the go-to medical facility in Allen and surrounding communities for people suffering a stroke, rather than transferring them to another hospital for care during a time when every second counts.

"I became very frustrated that the ambulance service in Fairview had to divert patients from Texas Health Allen to a stroke-certified hospital," says John. "Time is critical for a stroke patient and even a one-minute delay can make a huge difference in the patient's outcome."

John's father died from a stroke at a young age, so he knows first-hand how necessary it is to provide prompt care to a stroke patient. The gift from the Wrotens will help the hospital acquire the necessary equipment for the stroke program, as well as other elements needed for official certification which should be completed in within the next year.

The Ties that Bind

Like many, it was a medical issue that led the Wrotens to a thorough appreciation of Texas Health Resource's healing hands, caring hearts motto. In 1993, Leahray went in for a routine procedure at Texas Health Plano and a chest x-ray was performed. Her doctor found a spot on the lower lobe of her lungs, and they decided to remove it immediately. Sitting with Leahray in the recovery room, John heard the nurse cry out, "Oh no!" and watched him run out of the room. Leahray was bleeding internally after the surgery, and the doctor had left the building. Hospital staff called him as he was driving on the North Dallas Tollway, and he turned the car around and came back to save her life.

Another time, Leahray suffered a heart attack and was sent from Texas Health Allen to Texas Health Plano for surgery. Again, the caring nurses and physicians on the medical staff performed a life-saving procedure on Leahray.

John admits he has a habit of "interrogating" the staff each time he accompanies Leahray to the hospital or visits a friend at Texas Health. "I continue to be amazed by the excellence of the hospital staff and the tenure of so many," he says. "Once they land at Texas Health Resources, they don't want to practice anywhere else."

Today, Leahray is 100% healthy and happy to talk about why the Texas Health Resources system means so much to her and her husband. "As you get older, you look for ways to leave a footprint. Texas Health Resources has made such a difference in our lives," she says.

"When you're blessed, you have a responsibility to help make the world a better place. That's the way we were brought up. A lot of people practice this — we are just one of many."

New NICU Family Center in the Works at Texas Health Plano

In 2000, Texas Health Presbyterian Hospital Plano opened an 18-bed Level II specialty care nursery. In 2005, the nursery expanded to a 45-bed Level III Neonatal Intensive Care Unit. Now, designated as a Level IV NICU and Level IV Maternal Center, the hospital has increased its ability to care for its patients, and with it, the need for expansion.

To meet the need, Texas Health Plano is planning a new NICU Family Center designed specifically with NICU families in mind. Being in the NICU is hard – hard for the baby and especially hard on the parents. The hospital's aim is to make that stay a little easier. The new NICU Family Resource Center will help families who are visiting from out of town, families with infants who spend several days or months in care, and families who are transitioning home and need additional training to care for their babies.

That difference — the ability to help the tiniest patients — meant the world to Savannah and Chip Beringer. "We knew we wanted to be at Texas Health Plano because I had heard great things about their NICU. We had our first son, Henry, at Texas Health Plano in July of 2019, and I had a great experience," said Savannah. "So, when we became pregnant with our

second son, we knew that's where we wanted to be."

The Beringer's second son, Shepherd, came early at 33 weeks. "We knew we were in the absolute best place for him. We spent 55 days in the NICU, and the doctors, nurses, and therapists became like a second family."

Texas Health Denton Center Expands

Excitement is building at Texas Health Presbyterian Hospital Denton as it anticipates the opening of a \$128 million tower at the end of July. The 215,000-square-foot building will include a new women's center. The Center for Women's enhanced space will include a labor and delivery center housing 12 labor and delivery rooms, 29 postpartum and antepartum beds, and two dedicated surgical suites for C-sections.

"This project supports the Texas Health Mission of improving the health of the people in the communities we serve," said Jeff Reecer, president of Texas Health Denton. "And as the sole provider of OB and NICU services in Denton, our community depends on us. We are excited that this expansion will improve their experience when they are choosing where to bring their bundles of joy into the world."

The expansion will also include a breast center and spaces for physical therapy, cardiac rehab, support services, and a conference center. In addition, the expansion will add 10 Emergency



Department beds to the existing 28, including a seven-bay vertical ED fasttrack area.

"This expansion will make sure we're prepared to handle any increase in

demands as the population in Denton County continues to increase," said Barclay Berdan, CEO of Texas Health Resources. "We hope those growing their family will consider joining ours."

The Farrington-Thompson Legacy Society, which recognizes those whose philanthropy will impact the health of future generations, was inspired by Jerry Farrington and J. Andy Thompson, two gentlemen whose vision helped form Texas Health Resources, and whose service will benefit North Texans for years to come.

Both Jerry and Andy were named Chair Emeriti of the Texas Health Resources Board in 2002. Although we lost both of these North Texas legends in the last year, their stories deserve to be told for decades.

Jerry Farrington was instrumental in the formation of Texas Health Resources, acted as a founding trustee, served as its first vice chair, and later served as chair. His service to the organization continued through the years. He was a committed supporter of Texas Health Resources Foundation, serving as chair of the Legacy of Care Campaign, a fundraising campaign across Presbyterian hospitals, raising more than \$89 million in gifts from 2004 until 2009.

Jerry's commitment was rewarded throughout the years. Among the many honors he's received was the Distinguished Health Service Award from the Dallas-Fort Worth Hospital Council. In 2005, he received the Katie and John Jackson Award, and in 2011, he received the Douglas D. Hawthorne Leadership Award from Texas Health Presbyterian Foundation for his distinguished service and leadership.

J. Andy Thompson, as chair of the Harris Methodist Health System, was also instrumental in forging the new, integrated Texas Health Resources. His vision and leadership in that position, and then as Founding Chair of Texas Health Resources, helped to achieve the strength, unity, and success that it has today. Andy also chaired the Harris Methodist Health Foundation Board.

Andy and his wife, Nancy, were committed to helping others in the health community and established the Andy and Nancy Thompson Education Endowment. They also supported capital funding for the Texas Health Fort Worth hospital, the Texas Health Fort Worth Women's Wellness Fund, and the Texas Health Resources Excellence in Nursing
