



NEW HOPE FOR PATIENTS with CHRONIC DISEASES

In Allen, Texas, a new chapter of hope and healing has begun. Thanks to the generous support of the CMRC TX Fund, the newly established Community Resource Center (CMRC) at Texas Health Presbyterian Hospital Allen offers free, comprehensive healthcare to individuals with chronic illnesses and limited access to healthcare.

"The point of CMRC is to empower people to manage their own chronic disease, and this Center is here to give them the tools to do that," said Marsha Ingle, senior director of community health improvement.

The Texas Health Community Resource Center will provide qualifying residents with services such as bloodwork, education, and care tailored to chronic health conditions, including diabetes, high cholesterol, high blood pressure and congestive heart failure. Nutrition counseling and support groups also will be offered.

This program will take a holistic approach to community health improvement, from providing the medical care and education needed to manage their diabetes to helping put fresh, healthy produce on their dinner table.

In addition, community health workers will connect residents with a local network of resources and organizations that can help with their specific needs, ranging from paying rent or utilities to addressing a lack of transportation. The center is also home to a Good For You Healthy Hub, where eligible individuals can access free, fresh fruits and vegetables as well as recipes and other resources to help families make the most of the produce they receive.

"Providing healthcare without recognizing and addressing the underlying non-medical drivers of health – like economic stability, housing and nutrition security – is akin to putting a bandage on an infected wound and hoping things will get better," said David Tesmer, chief community and public policy officer for Texas Health. "Texas Health knows that we must treat the immediate medical need and also join with community organizations to target the underlying factors that further hinder health and well-being."

Collin County is home to some of the nation's most affluent cities. However, according to the American Community Survey, almost 10% of residents in that county lacked healthcare coverage. In addition, 65% of households that receive Supplemental Nutritional Assistance Program benefits have children under 18.

"Sadly, due to a variety of factors, many individuals avoid or delay seeking treatment for their chronic conditions until a medical crisis arises and they're forced to go to the emergency room," said Amanda Thrash, FACHE, president of Texas Health Allen. "The services and support provided at the Community Resource Center aim to reach communities earlier so we can prevent poor health outcomes and residents can live healthier, happier lives."



GENEROUS GRANT FROM THE MOODY FOUNDATION SUPPORTS THE SANE PROGRAM

For more than 13 years, Texas Health has helped bring healing and hope to thousands of victims of sexual abuse and assault in North Texas through its Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner (SANE) program. Now, thanks to a generous grant from the Moody Foundation, Texas Health can expand the SANE program, offering important new services.

Since 1942, the Moody Foundation has supported innovative ideas that make long-term improvements in our communities, adapting with the ever-changing challenges of our communities.

"The Moody Foundation is honored to support the expansion of Texas Health's SANE program," said Frances Moody-Dahlberg, CEO and President of the Moody Foundation. "We are deeply committed to standing with survivors of sexual assault, abuse, and interpersonal violence — ensuring they receive the compassionate, specialized care they need to heal, and helping to bring those who cause harm to justice."

The Moody Foundation's investment will support the addition of full forensic nursing services to the program offered across 11 Texas Health hospitals. Forensic nurses can provide expert testimony in legal proceedings and help judges and juries understand the nature of the injuries and the impact of the violence, filling a void needed to prosecute many of these cases.

With the expansion of services through the Moody Foundation's gift, Texas Health's SANE Program will now be called the Forensic Healthcare & Violence Intervention Program. The program will still rely on SANE nurses, but this transformative gift allows expansion into comprehensive forensic nursing care.

"The statistics around intimate partner violence are astounding," said Cindy Burnette, Director, Forensic Healthcare & Violence Intervention. "The World Health Organization (WHO) states that 1 in 3 women will experience intimate partner violence in their lifetime."

Emergency departments are required to screen patients for abuse, neglect, and exploitation. But through this program, Texas Health takes it one step further. "This is where our team can make a difference," said Burnette. Forensic nurses are specially trained to perform medical forensic examinations to assist in treating their medical needs but also to assist during any judicial processes.

"On average, a person will leave their abuser seven times before leaving for good," said Burnette. "Even though this person may not immediately leave the relationship, our goal is to plant a seed within them so that they know that there are people and organizations, like Texas Health, that are available to help."

EXPANDING CARE CLOSE TO HOME

The Arlington Tomorrow Foundation recently awarded Texas Health Arlington Memorial Hospital a generous \$500,000 grant for the renovation of its Breast and Women's Centers that will provide women with high-quality care in an environment designed for comfort.

The community of Arlington, Texas, certainly takes care of its own.

This is a challenge grant, which means the Arlington Tomorrow Foundation has generously pledged its support and now invites the community to join them with gifts to support the renovations at Texas Health Arlington.

The Arlington Tomorrow Foundation was created in 2007 by the Arlington City Council. The organization serves Arlington, Texas, exclusively and has contributed more than \$42 million in gifts that help support the people of Arlington since its inception.

"The Arlington Tomorrow Foundation is delighted to come alongside Texas Health in making these exciting projects a reality for the benefit of our Arlington community," said Carolyn Montesana, executive director of the Arlington Tomorrow Foundation. "This hospital is a cornerstone of our city, and we are proud to play a role in enhancing its service to women and their families."

Texas Health Arlington was constructed in 1958, and its Breast and Women's Centers serve approximately 15,000 women per year. While updates have been made over the years, a renovation of these spaces is needed to meet the growing demand for women's health services in Arlington, as well as neighboring communities.

"At Texas Health Arlington Memorial, we are making a difference in our community, especially in the area of women's health. As we know, women's health often affects not only the patient, but the entire family," said Blake Kretz, hospital president. "The grant from the Arlington Tomorrow Foundation will help us complete much-needed renovations in our Breast and Women's Centers and help us realize the vision of continued and enhanced quality service to the women in our area."



COMMUNITY STRONG FARM

Continues to Serve!

Community Strong Farm in Sanger, Texas, was started by First Refuge Ministries in 2019, funded by a grant from Texas Health Resources to provide fresh fruits and vegetables to encourage nutritional security in the community as part of the THRIVE (Together Harnessing Resources to give Individuals Voice and Empowerment) program. The farm supplies fresh food to the student-run grocery store at the Linda Tutt High School and local food banks.

Today, the partnership between Texas Health and Community Strong Farm continues, thanks to recent community support from Cross Timbers Rotary, Flower Mound Rotary, and the Henry Foundation. Their donations fund infrastructure improvements at the farm that will boost food production, harvest rainwater to ease the demand on the well, and establish an education center.
